This 2-day experience is a great way to immerse yourself in the undulating scenery on the Welsh Border and discover why the county holds so many musical and literary connections.

Herefordshire and border Churches feature highly in the history that shaped some of our music and literary greats.

This tour visits many of these churches as part of 'the history of Music and Literature' tour.

The tour is based in Hereford in a hotel on Half Board basis for the duration. This is where we will meet your tour guide to start the wonderful Music and Literature guided tour.

The first day begins heading east towards the town of Ledbury where poet Elizabeth Barret Browning spent her childhood and John Masefield was born. You will take in the scenery of the Malvern Hills which inspired Sir Edward Elgar, Charles Dickens and A.E Houseman on their travels. Not to forget poet William Langland who was possibly the first to celebrate the Malverns.

Close to Ledbury is an area that captured the imagination of the 'Dymock Poets' who generally comprised of Robert Frost, Lascelles Abercrombie, Rupert Brooke, Edward Thomas,Wilfrid Wilson Gibson, and John Drinkwater.

The second day will head west to the city of Hereford with its iconic Cathedral on the River Wye as well as discovering the picturesque landscape of Kington and Hay on Wye which inspired Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Rev Frances Kilvert, William Wordsworth and Thomas Treherne to name a few - Where very little has changed the rolling rural countryside.

However, we cannot forget modern day talents such as musician **Mike Oldfield** with Tubular Bells, **Mott the Hoople, Ellie Goulding** and supernatural and mystery novel author **Phil Rickman,** as well as the Festival of Literature that put 'town of books' Hay on Wye on the map and has been welcoming visitors for over 20 years.
